Technology Turns Low-Rank Coal into Green Fuel

Imagine a technology that could mass produce, without any damage to the environment, a new fuel that would help resolve future oil shortages. Silverado Green Fuel Inc. says it's on the verge of turning this idea into reality. The company has designed a technology that uses low-rank coal, which represents half of the U.S.'s coal reserves, to make so-called Green Fuel. It has entered into a "memorandum of understanding" with the Mississippi Development Authority and other state agencies to build a \$26 million "ecoplex" plant to produce this new form of low-cost alternative fuel by utilizing the state's vast low-rank coal reserves. Green Fuel is made by "pressure cooking" the coal to dehydrate the particles and release waxes and resins, leaving the particles in a safe, high-energy state and suspended in their originally extracted water. The water is treated and then added back to the dried coal. The end product is a thick, oily liquid, which can be used to power oilfired power plants directly or as a feedstock for further processing to produce transportation fuels, agricultural compounds (fertilizers, synthetic petrochemical feedstocks, ammonia), industrial products (oils, lubricants, synthetics), and even consumer products (plastics and packaging).
